Recognizing November 2025 as “National Family Caregivers Month”.

RESOLUTION

Recognizing November 2025 as “National Family Caregivers
Month”.

Whereas, in 2025, 63,000,000 family caregivers in the United
States provide essential care to millions of people each
year;

Whereas family caregivers provide unpaid care worth an esti-
mated \$600,000,000,000 annually and play a vital role in
the health care system of the United States, supporting
loved ones who have chronic illnesses, disabilities, and are
aging;

Whereas family caregivers, including grandparents who care
for children when parents are unable to do so, as well as
youth caregivers, often face significant challenges includ-

ing financial strain, physical and emotional exhaustion,
and social isolation;

Whereas in just the past 5 years, the number of family care-
givers has grown by 10,000,000 and is projected to con-
tinue to increase due to growing populations of older
adults and people with disabilities, the long-standing
shortage of direct care workers, and the lack of afford-
able, accessible child care for children with disabilities;
and

Whereas “National Family Caregivers Month” is an oppor-
tunity to recognize and appreciate the contributions of
family caregivers of all ages and to advocate for policies
that support family caregivers: Now, therefore, be it

1 *Resolved*, That the House of Representatives—

2 (1) recognizes “National Family Caregivers
3 Month”;

4 (2) commends the 63,000,000 family caregivers
5 in the United States who provide essential care to
6 their loved ones and chosen family each day;

7 (3) encourages Federal agencies, States, and
8 the private sector to swiftly implement the remain-
9 ing steps and build upon the current progress of the
10 steps described in the 2022 National Strategy to
11 Support Family Caregivers;

12 (4) encourages policies and strategies to sup-
13 port family caregivers as person- and family-cen-
14 tered, trauma-informed, and culturally appropriate;

1 (5) urges investment in policies that support
2 family caregivers, including—

3 (A) economic tax credits;

4 (B) paid family and medical leave;

5 (C) respite care;

6 (D) home- and community-based services;

7 and

8 (E) access to quality health care; and

9 (6) encourages all people of the United States
10 to learn more about family caregiving and to support
11 their loved ones and neighbors who are providing
12 care.
